



to have the musical performances complemented by several seasonal dramatised readings, including the Drama club's performance of 'The Night Before Christmas'.



Tasting History: Students Sample Passover

Year 7 students have been learning about the Jewish festival of Passover as part of their work learning about the origins and significance of Abrahamic religions (Judaism, Christianity and Islam)

Learning over recent lessons has been on the importance of Abraham and Mosses. Students have learnt about Moses and his role in leading the Jewish people out of slavery in Egypt via the Red Sea.

Students have learnt about what Jews do today to remember Moses through the festival of Passover. A central part of Passover is the Seder meal when different foods and drinks are consumed to remember what Moses did. For example, parsley is dipped in salt water before being eaten to symbolise the tears of the slaves and during lessons some students had a go at tasting this as well as looking at a Seder plate (see photo)

The photos show the Seder plate, a Passover Haggadah (similar to a service book) and a Seder plate labelled by a student.

Year 7

The Seeing Stone by Kevin Crossley-Holland: Follows the story of a young page to a knight.

1066 (I was There...) by Jim Eldridge Step back in to the battlefields of Hastings which places the reader at the heart of history.

Year 8

Chains by Laurie Halse Anderson explores the harsh world of the slave trade through the eyes of Isabel, a young girl seeking freedom amidst the challenges and complexities of her enslaved life.

Pastworld by Ian Beck immerses readers in a thrilling Victorian theme park where Jack the Ripper resurfaces. The novel intertwines mystery and historical elements, creating a captivating narrative within the unique setting of this immersive, dark amusement park.

Year 9

47 Days: The True Story of Two Teen Boys Defying Hitler's Reich tells the true and heart-wrenching stories of Lilly and Günter struggling with the terror-filled reality of life in the Third Reich, each embarking on their own dangerous path toward survival, freedom, and ultimately each other.

Lies We Tell Ourselves by Robin Talley unravels the intertwining lives of Sarah Dunbar and Linda Hairston, the first African American students in an all-white high school during the Civil Rights Movement. The novel delves into identity, love, and resilience amid societal upheaval, offering a poignant glimpse into personal transformation.

Year 8

Refugee Boy by Benjamin Zephaniah tells the story of Alem, a refugee who must learn to fend for himself in London.

Factfulness by Hans Rosling - using data and facts about the world the author reveals that the world is in a much better state than we often believe.

Noughts and Crosses by Malorie Blackman is a novel set in a dystopian Britain in which society is divided by racism.

The Lion, The Witch and the Wardrobe by C.S. Lewis is a classic children's fantasy novel that takes readers on a magical journey through a wardrobe into the enchanting world of Narnia where four siblings must battle the evil witch and restore the rightful ruler to the throne. Many people believe the story represents the triumph of Jesus over evil.

Set in 2002, A Very Large Expanse Of Sea takes readers on a clever and humorous love story between two Americans who come from different backgrounds. Shirin, a 16 year old Muslim girl living in post 9/11 America, and Ocean James, her lab partner.

Muhammad Ali His Life and Times by Thomas Hauser is seen as the classic Ali biography. It explains his faith and conversion to Islam and his journey to become the greatest.





Tudor time travel: a history-packed trip to Hampton Court

Our trip to Hampton Court was an immersive journey through the history of Tudor England. The highlight of the trip, our guided tour through the infamous Henry VIII's apartments, gave us an insight into not only the history of the estate but also the extravagant lifestyle of Henry and his children. Our visit to his extension of the Manor, the great hall that was built as a wedding gift for his second wife, Anne Boleyn, who he had executed before it was finished, and through the hallways of the apartments gave us a view on the thrones living in the 16th Century. The tapestries hung up in the great hall of Abraham was said to not been touched since Henry's death which dated back hundreds of years and shows the pristine state the Manor was kept in. Our analysis of sources dating back to the Tudor era also has given us beneficial information we can adapt into our own learning.

During our trip we also witnessed how in the Tudor times during its great religious reformation, the belief of always being watched was used by Henry and his successors to keep people loyal to them. The decoration of head carvings around the roof and walls of the palace gave the impression that you were always being watched, and this proved to show why many people



stayed loyal to the throne out of fear. Other parts of the palace like the original carvings of Roman Emperors had been kept on the manor after Henry took the estate from Cardinal Wolsey to help Henry's lies that the Tudors had been around longer than they had and fed his belief of his divine right to rule over England. The trip to Hampton Court not only provided a visual feast of Tudor architecture and artistry but also deepened my understanding of the dynamic historical forces that unfolded within the palace, making it a truly enriching and educational experience and providing a level of knowledge we can use during our studies in school.
